Activities:

The Maine Prairie Rifles was organized at Maine Prairie, Solano County September 9, 1863, with a membership of sixty-eight. The unit was armed with muskets. Captain Albert Burnett was elected chief commanding officer and retained the position throughout the company's five years of duration. As there is no apparent reason for the unit's organization, it is assumed it was organized for social purposes. However, the Maine Prairie Rifles were one of the companies re-organized under the Military Law of 1866. It was mustered into the National Guard of California as an unattached company November third of that year, and an election of officers took place on that date.

Under the Military Law of May 1868, the number of companies in the State were reduced, especially the units of the interior mining towns and others deemed unnecessary for public good. Consequently the Maine Prairie Rifles were ordered disbanded and mustered out of service January 23, 1869, by Special Order No. 2, for non-compliance with the Law. Major Hill was the mustering out officer and the arms and accoutrements of the corps were left in charge of Captain Burnett, Subject to the laws of the Adjutant General.*
