Activities:

During February of 1862 a group of loyal citizens of Placerville wished to organize a company of volunteer infantry, and gained permission from Judge James Johnson of Eldorado County to hold a meeting for that purpose. This meeting was held February twenty-second with John F. Pinkham presiding and superintending the election of officers. M. K. Shearer was elected Captain of the company which had selected the name of <u>Placerville Guard</u>, and John D. Boop was elected First Lieutenant.

The commissions were sent to Captain Shearer on March thirteenth of the same year by Adjutant-General Kibbe. However, the General was unable to furnish the company with arms until a new supply should arrive, and it was uncertain as to when arms would be available. It is evident the men lost interest without the necessary equipment for drilling purposes and soon disbanded.

No muster rolls of the <u>Placerville Guard</u> were received by the Adjutant-General, therefore, there was no date recorded of the disbandment of the company.

on July second of that year the Franklin Guard received forty-five stand of muskets from the Sheriff of Tuolumne County through an order from Adjutant General Kibbe. Captain Shell complained to General Kibbe about the condition and age of the muskets, intimating they probably saw service in the Maxican War in 1848. Correspondence between the Captain and the Adjutant General's Office revenues that the muskets reve intended for temporary use only
