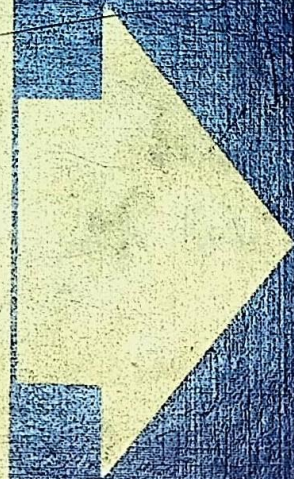

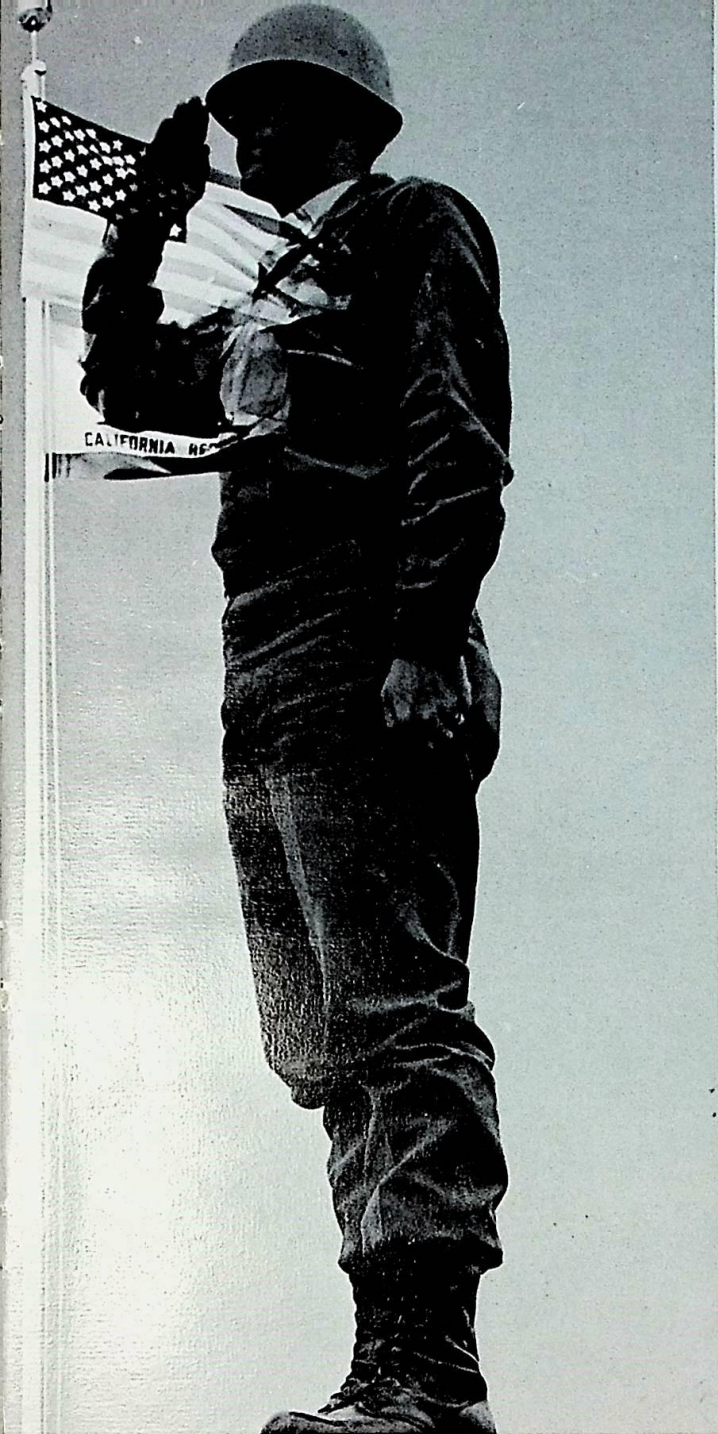
## CALIFORNIA MILITARY ACADEMY

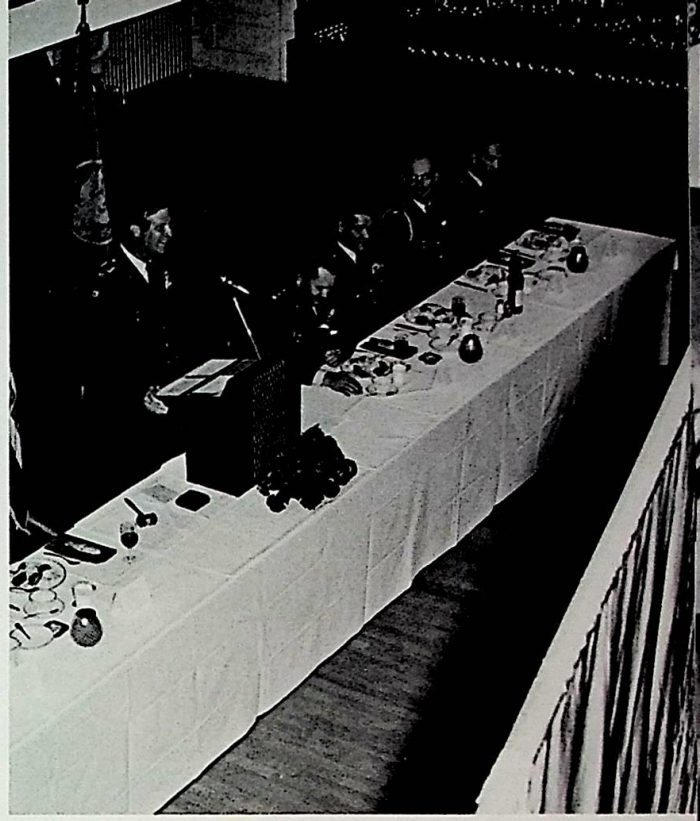
"Mr. Vice, I propose a toast." So goes a portion of the formality incorporated in the Dining-In. Mr. Vice sits in the back of the dining hall all to himself. He faces the president of the mess and has a set of chimes at his front. One of the most important things he does is announce: "Gentlemen, the meat is fit for human consumption."

The chimes, the dinner, the toasts, the before dinner drinking, the after dinner drinking, the speaker and Mr. Vice are all a part of a peculiar custom called the Dining-In.

The Dining-In is an old tradition in England, but not originally limited to the military. It is believed that the custom began in the monasteries, was later adopted by the early universities and then spread to military units when the officers mess was established.
