

HISTORY OF CMA

The California Military Academy - CMA - stands tall among OCS Programs across the country. It was in the summer of 1950 that Major General C. D. O'Sullivan, Commanding General of the 49th Division sought and received Department of the Army sanction for the Academy. This was the end result of recognition that there was a scarcity of Junior Officers in the California National Guard. It was the first Officer Candidate School established outside the regular Army, and as such, came under close scrutiny from all quarters.

The CMA is approaching a quarter-century of service, continuing its theme "Learn Today - Lead Tomorrow." To date, the Academy has commissioned in excess of 2, 400 second lieutenants. It is the principal source of new officers for the California Army National Guard. In keeping with the "One Army" policy of the Department of the Army, CMA training

is also made available to members of the United States Army Reserve.

The Academy is accredited by both the California State University System and the Department of the Army. It's program of instruction parallels that of the Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia.

CMA CLASS OF 1975

There are many paths to success in the modern Army National Guard of today. While some men and women prefer enlisted service towards the goals of national defense, others aspire to the officer corps.

3 August 1974 saw 113 young men select the path which guided them through a year c tedious training at the California Military Academy. The reward for this rigorous schooling was additional responsibility—the responsibility which goes with a commission as a second

lieutenant in the California Army National Guard.

From the very first day of Phase I it was apparent that the road to graduation would be a test of mental and physical endurance. Classroom instruction was to be with us for a full year, but it was the simulated pressure of combat that helped to develop us during our first AT at Camp San Luis Obispo. As the program continued, numbers grew smaller. By the second drill of Phase II some 40% of our initial complement has "washed-out". It was evident that only the truly dedicated among us would experience Graduation Day.

Returning to Camp San Luis Obispo for Phase III, we were a combined strength of 54 Cadets. The stress had taken its toll. Instructional periods were well thought-out and presented. Then came the time to apply classroom-learned principals to actual situations. It was at Camp Roberts where the seniors experienced night patrolling problems and mechanized infantry tactics. It was there that we found we did not know all the answers! The experiences and the confidences gained will serve as the cornerstones of the military careers of "The Class of 1975".

As CMA graduates, we are especially concerned that our future endeavors will reflect the traditions, as well as the expectations of this outstanding institution. To those who succeed us in the California Military Academy, we re-emphasize the ever present challenge to "Learn Today and Lead Tomorrow".
