

HISTORY OF CMA

The California Military Academy - CMA - stands tall among OCS Programs across the country. It was in the summer of 1950, as a result of a scarcity of Junior Officers in the California National Guard, that Major General C. D. O'Sullivan, Commanding General of the 49th Division, sought and received Department of The Army sanction for the Academy. It was the first Officer Candidate School established outside of the regular Army, and as such, came under close scrutiny from all quarters.

The CMA has surpassed a quarter-century of service, continuing it's theme "Learn To-day, Lead Tomorrow". To date, the Academy has commissioned in excess of 2,500 second lieutenants. It is the principal source of new officers for the California Army National Guard. In keeping with the "One Army Concept" of the Department of the Army, CMA training is also

made available to members of the United States Army Reserve.

The Academy is accredited by both the California State University System and the Department of the Army. It's program of instruction parallels that of the Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia.

CMA CLASS OF 1976

There are many paths to success in the modern Army National Guard of today. While some men and women prefer enlisted service towards the goals of national defense, others aspire to the officer corps.

May 1975, 104 young men and women selected the path which guided them through a year of tedious training at the California Military Academy. The regard for this rigorous schooling was additional responsibility - - the responsibility which goes with a commission as a second lieutenant in the California Army National Guard and United States Army Reserve.

From the very first day of Phase I it was apparent that the road to graduation would be a test of mental and physical endurance. Classroom instruction was to be with us for a full year, but it was the simulated pressure of combat that helped to develop us during Phase II at Camp San Luis Obispo. As the program continued, numbers grew smaller. By the second drill of Phase III, some 40% of our initial complement has "washed out". It was evident that only the truly dedicated among us would experience Graduation Day.

During Phase III it was obvious that stress had taken it's toll. Instructional periods were well thought-out and presented. Then came the time to apply classroom-learned principles to actual situations. It was then that we found we did not know all the answers. The experiences and the confidence gained will serve as the cornerstones of the military careers of the "Class"

of 1976".

As CMA graduates, we are especially concerned that our future endeavors will reflect the traditions, as well as the expectations of this outstanding institution. To those who succeed us in the California Military Academy, we re-emphasize the ever present challenge to "Learn Today and Lead Tomorrow".
