




The California Millitary Academy Conducts NGB Approved Advanced Non-Commissioned Officers Course At Camp San Luis Obispo

The Golden Challenge has included in this year's book a special section on the California Army National Guard Advanced Non-Commissioned Officers Course which was held at Camp San Luis Obispo during the period August 4th thru 12th,

The courses offered are designed to meet the needs of the first-line supervisor at the squad, section and platoon level. It is aimed towards the middle-level NCO's and is part of their overall educational program.

The course consists of 61 hours of instruction which places emphasis upon the development of leadership and management skills. The objective of the program is to provide career development and educational opportunities, and to provide the Army NCO school was "outstanding!"

National Guard with highly trained and dedicated Non-Commissioned Officers to fill positions of increasing responsibility, to increase the professional quality of the Non-Commissioned Officer Corps, to provide leadership and management techniques that apply to their duty positions and to develop an appreciation for the high personal and professional standards that must be maintained in the Non-Commissioned Officer Corps.

A total of 167 diplomas were awarded with each individual achieving a minimum academic average of 70% or higher.



History Of CMA

It was the summer of 1950 and junior officers in the California National Guard were

fast becoming a rare commodity.

Responding to the situation at hand, Maj. Gen. C. D. O'Sullivan, then commanding general of the 49th Division, conceived a program that would remedy the deficiency. He sought and received authorization from the Department of the Army to establish an "Officer Candidate School" outside of the existing system.

The school, offering commission opportunity to enlisted persons already in the California National Guard, immediately came under close scrutiny from all quarters.

The program proved successful and began to expand its format to provide the best possi-

ble instruction.

Although the school continued to grow in size and importance, it had no suitable facili-

ties for academic training. In 1961, Camp San Luis Obispo was able to accommodate the school. Two years later, the name was changed and the California Military Academy (CMA) had found a home.

The course of instruction at CMA parallels that of the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Georgia, providing solid training in the basic skills and capabilities required of a junior officer.

The program comes under continuing observation and evaluation, and is comparable to the specialized officer candidate school within the active Army.

Academically accredited by the California State College System and the Department of the Army, the California Military Academy has for 29 years lived its motto:

LEARN TODAY - LEAD TOMORROW

To the Graduating Class of the California Military Academy:

My congratulations to you as you assume your positions of leadership in the California National Guard.

The response to both federal requirements and state emergencies depends largely upon your training and motivation of the men and women who will be in your charge. Use your authority wisely in preparation for those concurrent missions and for the benefit of those whose efforts you direct.

In the future, you will be the emerging leaders of the Guard; prepare now for those increased responsibilities.



Congratulations! You have given yourself to a demanding and rigorous program and have prevailed. Now you enter upon your commissioned careers; you have the knowledge and the desire to progress as far as your abilities will take you. You are the platoon leaders whose decisions now impact upon others as well as upon yourselves.

If the units you lead have high morale, good training and are ready to perform their assigned missions - all of us succeed. Both the present and the future of the Guard depend on your efforts and your success.




Graduation day, however, is neither a beginning nor an end. Rather, it is a way station in our military careers. We




Evaluation Panel


