BULLETIN NO. 1

To Principals and Commandants of Cadets
California High School Cadets


1. The Adjutant General, Brigadier General Victor R. Hansen, has authorized an annual encampment of the California High School Cadets to be held in Sacramento, if war conditions permit, the week of March 26 to March 31, 1945. In order to obtain necessary information relative to the possibility of cadets attending this encampment which will be limited to approximately 500 young men throughout the State, it is requested that information be furnished as to whether or not cadets from your school would be able to attend this encampment. The average daily attendance in each case effecting the schools would be carried on to the credit of the school as usual. Each school would be limited to a certain percentage of cadet enrollment, and these should be officers and non-commissioned officers in the junior and low senior classes, so that the instruction received could be used by these various cadet officer leaders in the fall program of 1945. Transportation by army conveyance from central points throughout the State will assure proper transportation to and from the home station under the guidance of State Guard officers and equipment. Transportation, meals and lodging will be furnished all cadets attending; and requirements are that the regulation high school cadet uniforms will be mandatory for attendance. Complete orders will follow shortly. The War Council has given permission for the encampment to be held.

2. No doubt your school has been advised by the 9th Service Command that films will be restricted to schools having certified army projectionists. Indorsement has been received by this office exempting all schools in the California High School Cadet Corps from those provisions and you will carry on with your film program under present arrangements through this headquarters. New applications for films are enclosed with this bulletin and these applications should be made in advance in sufficient time for their showing, requisitions for not more than two dates to be sent in at one time.

3. We are assured by the War Department that the trainee rifles will be available to those schools that have requisitioned them in the very near future.

4. The matter of a standard uniform is now being adopted by the Adjutant General's Office and will be available through purchase under State contract at a very nominal sum within the near future. Full particulars on this important matter will be issued later.

1. Reference Bulletin No. 1, this Headquarters, 9 February 1945,
Subject: Annual Encampment, California High School Cadets.

2. The Encampment will be located at Camp Kohler, U. S. Army Air Corps, Sacramento, California, 24 March to 30 March 1945, inclusive, as authorized by General of the Army, H. H. Arnold, Commanding General, Army Air Forces.

3. Cadets are to be selected by each school as follows: 60% Cadet Officers (Juniors or low Seniors); 30% Non-Commissioned Officers (Juniors); and 10% Privates (Juniors). Unit quota attached.

4. Attached applications for admission to the Encampment, (to be completed on one side only), and Medical Examination (to be completed on both sides). It will be necessary to fill in these cards immediately and mail to reach this Headquarters not later than 17 March 1945.

5. Owing to limited facilities and appropriations, certain Commandants have been selected to attend the Encampment as Instructors and will be announced jointly by Special Orders to follow.

6. Upon return of these applications, Special Orders will be issued covering necessary items of clothing and equipment for use in Camp, to be furnished by each cadet. Transportation will be provided. Schools south of Bakersfield and schools north of Redding will be entrained 23 March 1945. All other schools will be entrained on 24 March 1945. Departure from the Encampment will take place at 1300, 30 March 1945. All cadets will arrive at home stations not later than 31 March 1945.

7. Upon arrival at Camp Kohler, cadets will report to the Commandant for the Cadet School for temporary duty for a period of approximately seven days as cadet students in basic cadet training; and unless earlier relieved will, upon completion of course of study, be returned to their home stations, by 2200, 31 March 1945, the travel directed by the California State Guard.

8. Cost of transportation, quarters and mess to be paid from funds of the California High School Cadet Corps appropriation.

1. Under the provisions of Section 516.1 (Chapter 179, Statutes 1941) Military and Veterans Code, State of California, selected cadets under Special Order No. 7, 7 March 1945 will be ready to entruck for the Annual Encampment, Camp Kohler, California, as follows: south of Bakersfield and north of Redding, Friday, 23 March 1945. Exact time and marching orders to follow about 21 March 1945. Schools Bakersfield and north, Redding and south will entruck 24 March 1945. Marching orders to follow as to exact time on or about 22 March 1945. All cadets will be entrucked for the Encampment as per the marching order by special convoy to Camp Kohler.

2. Each cadet will bring the following:

- a. Uniform complete. (Khaki)
- b. Gym outfit with gym shoes
- c. Personal effects for seven days
- d. Sweater to be worn under shirt
- e. Sufficient spending money for post exchange purchases and two shows - 15¢ each
- f. Fatigues will be furnished by the Adjutant General
- g. Bedding will be furnished by Camp Kohler

3. Cadets will not be permitted the use of private cars on the post.

4. The white physical examination card must accompany each cadet to the Encampment, provided it has not been mailed into this office.



Six hundred cadets of junior and senior years of 101 high schools throughout the State have enrolled for the Spring Annual Encampment of the California High School Cadet Corps. The encampment opens with the arrival of the cadets Saturday, March 24, at Camp Kohler, Sacramento. (ROSTER, BY TOWNS, ATTACHED).

Complete facilities of Camp Kohler have been made available for the week's training period by General H. H. Arnold, Commanding General of the Army Air Forces. The cadets will live true military life for the entire encampment - quartered in Army Barracks, clothed in Army uniforms and subject to Army regulations. The week's program will be devoted to intensive military training that includes: Close Order Drill, Physical Drill, Hygiene and First Aid, Obstacle Course, Interior Guard Duty, Marksmanship and Parade Formations.

Featured in the training will be demonstrations of Army infantry weapons and chemical warfare by army instructors and personnel assigned for the purpose of assisting California State Guard staff instructors of the Adjutant General's Department.

Army training films will also be used in the intensified program which is designed to prepare these junior officers to replace their seniors upon graduation.

California is the first state to provide military training for any high school group of forty or more students who desire such training. This training is under the administration of Brigadier General Victor R. Hansen, The Adjutant General.

Lt. Colonel William Rutherford, Administrative Officer of the corps, is commandant of the training school, Lt. Colonel R. A. W. Pearson, Plans and Training Officer, Captain Leo A. Harris, Executive Officer, and Captain William Gardner, Adjutant.

The benefits of pre-induction military training are recognized by Army authorities as evinced by their active support of the California High School Cadet Corps.

"I receive many letters daily from former cadets who are now in the armed forces", states Colonel Rutherford. "These lads are thrilled with their rapid military progress. Promotions come more quickly to those who have been prepared and there is no doubt that the transition from civilian to military life is made easier through previous training".

633 cadets responded to the 5:45 reveille this morning at the spring encampment of the California High School Cadet Corps at Camp Kohler, Sacramento.

Coming from 101 high schools throughout California, these junior and senior students have quickly and easily adapted themselves to the military life that has been programmed for the six day period.

The entire contingent arrived on schedule without mishap, transported from their home stations in army trucks. Transportation was handled throughout by California State Guard officers and personnel who set up the schedule as a tactical maneuver, employing the army trucks and command cars that are furnished the Guard by the Federal Government.

Camp Kohler was made available to the cadet corps by General H. H. Arnold, commanding general of the Army Air Forces. Major Gilson McNeill, commanding officer of Camp Kohler, has well expressed the army's approval of the encampment in warm and generous hospitality. Late arriving cadets were welcomed at midnight by army cooks, who had prepared hot chocolate and sandwiches.

Brigadier General Victor R. Hansen, the Adjutant General, who administers the training program of the Corps, welcomed the cadets in an address that highlighted the advantages of military training as a pre-induction benefit as well as a solid foundation for good citizenship and successful business life. The average day's program is devoted to basic military training which will prepare the attending young cadet officers to replace their seniors upon graduation. The schedule includes demonstrations of infantry weapons and chemical warfare by army personnel.

Tuesday evening, the cadets will be the special guests of General C. W. Howard, commanding general of Sacramento Technical Service Command, at McClellan Field to attend a U.S.O. show planned for the occasion.

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ADDRESS BY BRIGADIER GENERAL VICTOR R. HANSEN,
The Adjutant General, to California High School
Cadets at Annual Encampment, Camp Kohler.

With just a few words, I wish to extend to all of you a warm welcome to the Annual Encampment. I know that the next few days of training are going to be a great experience for you. And I want you all to dignify the memory of this encampment with the thought that you are actually here as "guests" of General Arnold, Commanding General of the Army Air Forces.....it is through General Arnold's keen appreciation of the importance of the California High School Cadets that Camp Kohler has been made available for this period. Therefore, you should all feel that the time you spend in training in fact, the importance of the entire program is recognized by the Army as an important factor in the war effort.

The encampment starts a new chapter in the lives of most of you cadets. Just a few years ago, many of you probably attended summer camps or encampments of boys' organizations. Those first camps definitely changed you in many respects - you were away from home - perhaps for the first time - you learned how to rely upon yourself and were taught the many, many things about outdoor life that go to make a good citizen, and a good soldier.

The experiences made you aware of certain responsibilities that mark the difference between boys and young men. You learned the fundamental principles of good character and citizenship. But, you were really boys - learning how to become young men.

Today, you are young men. During this encampment, you are going to live like soldiers, you are going to act like soldiers, you are going to be soldiers. And soldiers are not boys. In other words, you are going to get a preview of military life that is not available to many young men of your age. This is an unusual privilege and I know that you are going to thoroughly enjoy it. You like military life - or you would not be here today. So, make the most of this short week - live every moment of it and get the very best out of the training that you possibly can.

No one can tell just how long this war is going to last - we only know that it has been a rugged war and, in its last phases, will probably be even more rugged. Many of you cadets will soon enter the armed forces. It is not my place to tell you how great a privilege it is to serve your country - you are Americans and need no telling. I do feel that it is my duty, however, to firmly

impress you with this fact: when you do serve - serve well. As soldiers, as officers, as gentlemen - remember that first of all, you are an American and American soldiers have a certain spirit, a certain know-how, and a certain courage that stand for the very ideals of Americanism.

I know that your training as cadets will prepare you well for your military life, but I hope that you all realize and appreciate the true values of this training. In my army experience I had, personally, learned of these values. I saw young men advance more rapidly than others because they had pre-induction military training. A young man with such training is easily recognized: his bearing, his deportment, his cheerful attitude, and his capacity for absorbing the Army training is naturally greater than if he were freshly new to military life.

It is no wonder that such men have an advantage over those who have not had the benefit of pre-induction training. Incidentally, our office files contain many, many letters from former cadets who have progressed rapidly in the Army and who tell us that this progress was a direct result of their cadet training.

Personal experience has taught me the values of military training applied in business and professional life. The very qualities that go to make a good soldier are definite factors in the success of a business leader. The things that you are learning in military training can well apply in your business life: leadership, discipline, clear-thinking, co-ordination, physical fitness and those intangible characteristics that are apparent in successful men. So let me stress this point, too- the training that you receive in the cadet corps is indeed a sound investment for your future life, whether you choose a military career or venture into the business world, some day - in some way - your accomplishments will be related to this phase of your education.

As Adjutant General the administration of the cadet corps is one of my responsibilities. As close as the High School Cadet Corp Program is to me, I feel that both you and I are indeed fortunate in having Colonel Rutherford as Administrative Officer of the corps and as Commandant of this Camp. Colonel Rutherford has done a tremendous job in building the corps to its present high level.

And now, in closing, I do not want to sound like a football coach giving the team a pep-talk between halves, but I do want to

leave this thought with you: You are here for a week's intensive training. Make the most of it. Put forth your best efforts and you will leave the camp better men and certainly better soldiers and with a feeling of a job well done. We are proud of you and of the organization which you represent. Good luck.

All officers on duty with convoys moving High School Cadets from their homes to Camp Kohler and return to their homes are directed to observe the following rules and instructions:

Vehicles will not be allowed to violate the top speed of 35 miles per hour.

Intervals between vehicles will be three times the speed of mileage while traveling on the road. This does not apply while moving through cities or congested areas.

Vehicles will always travel on the right of the road.

Drivers will observe all provisions of U. S. Army Convoy Regulations and will adhere to all local ordinances while enroute.

Extreme care will be observed while moving through cities and towns.

When approaching a railroad crossing or street car intersection, care will be observed to post at least a non-commissioned officer at crossings before the first vehicle crosses and remain in position until the last vehicle has passed.

Smoking will not be permitted in cab or body of the trucks.

Entrucking and detrucking will be performed only upon order of the convoy officers and in the manner prescribed by him.

Prior to entrucking and immediately following detrucking all cadets will form a line on the right side of the highway according to their position in the truck with the head of the line opposite the front bumper. The senior NCO in each truck will be responsible for the formation and conduct in each truck and will be seated on the right hand side of his truck. A guard should be posted so that no cadets will be allowed to cross highway or stand on highway or other right-of-way.

Section I - General

1. No person, military or civilian, shall operate any Government owned motor vehicle (either general or special purpose) without having previously secured prescribed Government Driver's License, Ordnance Form No. 7360, from the Post Motor Transportation Officer at Motor Pool. All drivers of Government owned motor vehicles shall comply strictly with provisions of AR 850-15, and all current City, County and State driving laws.

2. The Military Police and/or Civilian Guards will be held responsible for the enforcement of traffic regulations.

3. All officers and noncommissioned officers are charged with the duty of taking the license numbers of vehicles, public or private, within the Post, which are seen driving in a careless or reckless manner, or otherwise violating traffic regulations, and reporting them to the Security and Intelligence Officer.

4. A record of all reported violations will be maintained at the Post Security and Intelligence Office.

Section II - Accidents.

1. The following procedure will be followed in all cases of accidents involving motor transportation of this command either on or off the reservation;

a. The senior officer or enlisted man present will:

- (1) Obtain license numbers of the vehicles involved.

- (2) Obtain names and addresses of drivers.
- (3) Obtain names and addresses of passengers.
- (4) Obtain names and addresses of witnesses.
- (5) Write down time and place.
- (6) Ascertain whether any military personnel were injured.
- (7) In case of injuries of a minor nature, see that military personnel are taken to the Station Hospital for an examination.
- (8) If the accident involves a Government owned vehicle, notify the Motor Transportation Officer.
- (9) Obtain written signed statements of witnesses, if possible, covering what the witness saw.
- (10) Make a written report to the Post Security and Intelligence Officer Immediately.
- (11) In accidents occurring off the post in which Military Personnel or Government vehicles are involved, notify State Highway Patrol immediately.

b. Any person in the military service injured in an automobile accident will, if physically able, report to the Station Hospital for examination.

c. Operators of Government owned motor vehicles involved in an accident will, if physically able, fill out Form No. 26 "Driver's Report-Accident", immediately after the accident and will deliver this report to the Motor Transportation Officer who will in turn send copy of report to the Post Security and Intelligence Officer.

Section III - Equipment

1. Lights. All motor vehicles or bicycles in motion on the reservation during the hours of darkness shall display lights, visible from at least two hundred (200) feet in the direction in which displayed as follows:

a. All trucks or passenger cars will have two white lights in front, and at least one red light in the rear.

b. Motorcycles or bicycles will have at least one white light in front, and one red light or reflector in the rear.

c. Headlights of all vehicles will be dimmed, or beam deflected downward, on meeting another vehicle.

2. Brakes. All privately owned motor vehicles will comply with the State and City laws relative to brakes, light and mechanical inspections.

3. Horn. Every motor vehicle will be equipped with a horn or klaxon.

4. Windshield Wiper. Every motor vehicle will be equipped with a windshield wiper.

5. All motor vehicles will be equipped with mufflers. These mufflers will not be "cut-out" on the reservation.

Section IV - Identification at Gates.

1. As a necessary safeguard, the sentry at the gate will satisfy himself that each car bearing a Camp Kohler license sticker leaving or entering the Post is in charge of a person authorized to drive the car. All cars ~~will stop~~ for this identification to be established. Owners sending their cars from the Post by other than customary driver will provide the driver with written authority for removing the vehicle from the post.

Section V - Parking

1. Vehicles will not be parked on any road in the garrison area except those designated by the Post Security and Intelligence Office, nor will they be left in a position which will obstruct the free passage of fire trucks.

2. Vehicles will be parked on parking lots in a straight line at right angles to the line of parking, with one and one-half feet distance between vehicles. All vehicles will be parked headed in.

3. No vehicle will be parked within twenty (20) feet of any fire hydrant or within forty (40) feet of a street intersection.

4. Parking is prohibited within ten (10) feet of a building unless otherwise approved by the Post Fire Marshal.

5. Restricted parking areas will be marked with appropriate signs.

6. During parades or ceremonials, vehicles will be parked as directed by the Military Police and/or Civilian Guards.

7. The parking of vehicles in the area in front of building T-515 and extending to the Kohler Avenue gate, is not permitted. Parking areas are provided immediately north of Building T-515 (Headquarters Building), south and north of Meyer Street. Only automobiles of casual visitors to this headquarters and official passengers may be parked in the area in front of building T-515.

8. When vehicles are parked to the side of streets, they will be parked in such a manner that the vehicle is parallel to the traveled way.

Section VI - Miscellaneous

1. The search of motor vehicles at the direction of the Security and Intelligence Officer is authorized. Upon authorization of the Security and Intelligence Officer only, any members of the Guard may stop any car and search same for unauthorized possession of government property or for other purposes.

2. The Security and Intelligence Officer, through members of the Military Police and/or Civilian Guards, is authorized to issue summons for violations of any of the above rules or for any of the general rules and traffic regulations as published in AR 850-15. An offender so summoned will personally appear before the Security and Intelligence Officer at such time as is prescribed by him where their case will be heard. The Security and Intelligence Office will keep a record of such traffic violators as appear before him. In the event that an individual is summoned to appear before the above officer three or more times within any one year, or has been cited for any serious traffic violation, the Security and Intelligence Officer will immediately forward all information regarding the case to the Commanding Officer with such recommendations as he deems necessary to properly punish the offender.

3. The Security and Intelligence Officer is hereby authorized to suspend Post driving privileges of any member of this command up to one week.

Section VII - Movement of Troops.

1. Troops marching in formation will move with traffic as far to the right side of the road as possible taking advantage of shoulders where available. When approaching an intersection, the right guide will post himself at the intersection to see that the road is clear in all directions before troops proceed to enter. When crossing streets or roadways at right angles a flanking movement will be used.

2. Groups of four (4) or more will march in formation at attention.

Section VIII - Pedestrians.

1. The practice of hitch-hiking (the soliciting of free rides from passing motorists) is prohibited. This will not be construed to prevent soldiers from accepting rides volunteered by passing motorists.

2. Pedestrians will walk in column of two's, or less, on the left side of the road, facing approaching traffic. Sidewalks will be used where provided.

Section IX - Registration.

1. ~~All~~ persons, military and civilian, who are on duty at Camp Kohler and who desire to operate their car on the Post, and other persons having regular business on the Post will register their motor vehicle at the office of Security and Intelligence (Bldg T-515, Room 23).

2. All operators of privately owned automobiles must have a driver's permit from some state which is currently in force.

3. Insurance.

a. All personnel, both military and civilian residing or employed on this Post, owning and/or operating a motor vehicle on the Post will be required to have and maintain insurance covering the said vehicle in the form of public liability of not less than \$5,000 to \$10,000 and property damage of not less than \$5,000. Proof of ownership of such insurance will be a prerequisite of such registration prior to operation of vehicle.

b. Commercial vehicles operating on the Post will comply with the state laws.

4. Before a person is issued a registration number he will file with the Security and Intelligence Office a certification to the effect that he has read and fully understands the Post Traffic Regulations.

5. License stickers are printed and are numbered and assigned by color and design as follows:

- a. Officers - Red Star - Prefix letter "K" before number.
- b. Enlisted Men - Blue Propeller - Prefix letter "K" before number.
- c. Civilians - Blue Wings - Prefix letter "K" before number.

Section X - Responsibility of Owners.

1. Whatever the responsibility attached to drivers, the registered owner of a motor vehicle retains responsibility for its operation at all times. Penalties for violation of regulations will be adjudged in accordance with the merits of each case.

2. Children under sixteen (16) years of age are prohibited from operating motor vehicles on the reservation.

3. The use of tags bearing the words "U.S. Army", "U.S. Army Reserve", "Army Air Corps", or any other tag which would seem to indicate United States ownership or control on privately owned vehicles is prohibited.

Section XI - Right of Way.

1. At an intersection, the vehicle to the right has the right of way with the following exceptions in order of precedence.

- a. Fire Trucks.
- b. Ambulances.
- c. Formations of soldiers in ranks.

Section XII - Signals.

1. The following signals for change in direction or speed will be used at this station:

a. To slow down, or stop - hold the left arm out of the left side of the car with the forearm downward at an angle of 45-degrees.

b. To turn left - hold left arm out the left side of the car with the forearm horizontal.

c. To turn right - hold the left arm out the left side of the car with the forearm extended upward at an angle of 45-degrees.

d. Electric signal lights as installed on cars may be used in lieu of A, B, or C above.

Section XIII - Speed Limit.

1. All road signs have the effect of official orders. In case the speed limit is not indicated by a traffic sign, the following maximum speeds shall apply:

- a. On all roads on the Post - 20 M.P.H.
- b. While passing troops in formation - 10 M.P.H.

c. Even though a person may be driving within the limits set forth in a, b, and c above, he may be considered driving carelessly when he endangers life or property. Pedestrians will always be given the right of way. Care in driving must be exercised at all times.

2. All traffic signs at gates, intersections, etc., have the force of orders except where proper authorities are directing traffic at that location, in which case the traffic director's instructions will govern.

Section XIV - Taxicabs.

1. All taxicabs are forbidden to enter this post.

Section XV - Safe Driving Rules.

1. Watch the road. Inattention is the cause of most accidents.
2. Refuse to drink intoxicants when driving a car.
3. Obey all warning signs and signals.
4. Stay on your own side of the road.
5. Signal your intention to turn or stop.
6. Do not stop in a traffic lane.
7. Keep your automobile mechanically safe.
8. Be sure the way is clear before attempting to pass.
9. Dim your lights for approaching cars.
10. ~~Be alert~~ Be alert for cross traffic at all intersections.
11. Adjust your speed to traffic and weather conditions.
12. Slow down for railroad crossings.

Section XVI - Government Vehicles.

1. General. Safe driving, care and prudence, consideration of others, and constant care of government equipment are expected of all drivers and passengers in Government vehicles.

- a. The Post Motor Transportation Officer is responsible for the examination and instructions of drivers assigned to operate Government

motor vehicles and the maintenance and inspection of all Government owned motor vehicles.

b. Vehicles released from the Motor Pool will be driven by the driver in whose name the trip ticket is made unless the Chief Dispatcher or Truck Master authorizes a change in writing.

c. If circumstances require an officer to order a driver to exceed the speed limit or ignore any other driving rule, the driver will obtain a written indorsement on the trip ticket with the reason necessitating the order.

d. The gate guards will check all Government vehicles leaving the Post for trip tickets. The trip ticket must bear the words "Off Post" stamped across its face.

e. Officers will report any traffic violations, misconduct of drivers or damage to vehicle when they sign the release on the trip ticket.

2. Motor Convoy Instructions.

a. Vehicles in convoy will observe the speed limit of 30 miles per hour on highways and 20 miles per hour on country roads, and 20 miles per hour through small towns. This speed limit will not be exceeded at any time. The Senior Officer of the convoy will ride the front vehicle and be responsible for strict observance of speed limits. The officer or non-commissioned officer, second in command, will ride in the last vehicle in order to more closely supervise the operation of the convoy.

b. In the absence of state or city police escort, convoys will observe all local and state regulations for individual travelers. The convoy will move only on green lights, unless guards are posted at the intersections.

c. Trucks will maintain a minimum distance in yards of twice the convoy speed in miles per hour when on open highways. In cities and towns, vehicles will maintain a minimum distance of 30 feet.

d. If a vehicle in a convoy has difficulty in maintaining convoy speed, or is disabled in any way, it will immediately draw off to the side of the road and the driver will signal the following vehicles to pass and proceed. The driver will then receive instructions from the second in command of the convoy who will be riding in the last vehicle. At no time will an effort be made to exceed the speed limit in order to catch up with the convoy proper.

e. A Truck Master in charge of all vehicles in the convoy will be conductor of the convoy and will report convoy in readiness to the officer in charge of the troops before any men will be permitted to entruck. The Truck Master will report that the convoy is ready to unload before the officer in charge will permit any troops to unload. The individual truck drivers will be in charge of the unloading and loading of their own vehicles and will be responsible that no canvas is struck, or tail gates opened without permission of Truck Master.

f. All troops detrucking from a convoy will immediately move off

to the right side of the road unless all other traffic has been halted on the highway.

Section XVII - Transporting Personnel.

1. Trucks while being used to transport military or civilian personnel shall be equipped with a seating arrangement and a rear-end gate, closed and securely fastened. Riding on flat beds without side and rear stakes is not permitted.

2. Only one person shall be permitted to ride in the cab seat with the truck driver. Brakes shall be inspected weekly.

3. Under no circumstances shall personnel be permitted to ride with their arms or legs outside of truck body; in a standing position in the body, or running boards, seated on side fenders, rear of truck or on the load.

4. Bodies of dump trucks shall be made fast to chassis while being used in transport of human load. They shall be securely fastened by a rope, chain or equivalent in addition to the normal locking device.

5. Provisions shall be made to stow, securely, tools and equipment while being transported with a human load.

6. No one shall be permitted to get on or off any motor vehicle or railroad freight or passenger car while it is in motion.

7. Extreme care must be exercised in the operation of trucks, particularly in backing up same. Driver must come to full stop and make certain that no person is behind or will be behind vehicle when backed up.

8. No repair in field or shop shall be made involving lift bodies of dump trucks, trailer-tractors or similar equipment without locking or other fastening in addition to lift mechanism to avoid possible injury through failure of such mechanism.

Section XVIII - Railroad Operations.

1. All passenger and freight train and switching movements in and out of and on Government trackage at Camp Kohler will be conducted with extreme care, particularly, at intersections and warehouse platforms. Crossing movements must be at very slow speed with bell ringing and switchman flagging locomotive or back-up. All Interstate Commerce Commission and connecting carrier railroad operating rules will be strictly complied with. All impaired clearances, crossings, etc., must be suitably marked with signs. Spotted cars will be properly braked and blocked to prevent uncontrolled movement.

Section XIX - Hazardous or unusual movements.

1. Any hazardous or unusual movement, such as steam shovels, drag line cranes, house-moving or loads projecting in front, on side or to rear of carrier shall be protected with red flags in daytime and red lights at night time and where necessary preceded by a pilot car or man on foot with red flag or red lights to warn all traffic.

2. With the approach of Fire Apparatus, vehicles will immediately proceed to the side of the road and stop. Pedestrians will step off the road and marching troops will move directly off the road with a flanking movement.

MEMORANDUM TO: TROOPS QUARTERED IN SECTION

The following will be read to all troops at the first formation after arrival.

1. Troops will comply with instructions posted in barracks regarding build- and contents.
2. Police all areas, including streets, adjacent to buildings assigned to your unit. No trash receptacle other than No. 10 tin cans are allowed in the barracks. Place all trash in GI cans which are along company street. Keep lids on GI cans. Do not move GI cans.
3. Place salvable paper in can marked "Paper". All other trash in other can.
4. Do not deface walls of buildings or destroy property.
5. Do not play football or baseball except in recreation area. Athletic equipment may be drawn by a Section Officer at Building: Block:
6. Bottles may not be removed from the PX.
7. Unoccupied buildings, areas, Utilities, i. e. Pumping Stations, Boiler plants etc., and the lumber yards in West Area of Camp are strictly OFF LIMITS.
8. Use MAIN GATE only for entering and leaving camp.
9. Prescribed uniform will be worn in all formations, on pass, to the theatre or PX. Proper head dress will be worn at all times when outside of buildings. Camp dress regulations are posted in each barracks.
10. Fall out for meals with your unit. Do not take any food to barracks.

MEMORANDUM TO ALL QUARTERED UNITS:

1. Barracks and outside areas adjoining buildings will be kept clean at all times.
 - a. An orderly will be detailed each day to keep shower room and latrine clean.
 - b. Smoking in or on beds, laying cigars or cigarettes on window ledges, bed rails, racks in latrines, floors and on clothing shelves is prohibited.
 - c. All waste paper and rubbish will be kept off the floors and put in GI cans on company street. Cans will not be removed from stands nor used for other purposes. Cans will be cleaned and washed before unit leaves.
 - d. Maps showing areas to be policed by each unit will be issued from section headquarters.
2. Inspection of each area will be conducted each day at 0900 by Section Inspection Officer. He will be accompanied by CO of quartered unit.
3. Windows will not be removed from buildings for cleaning.
4. No beds will be moved from one building to another unless authorized by the Company Commander.
5. Mattresses will not be used without covers. Mattress covers will be issued as soon as units arrive. Unit Supply Officer will contact Section Supply Officer for drawing of covers. Any mattresses damaged will be reported at once to Section Supply Officer. All unused mattresses will be stored in Supply Room.
6. Butt cans are installed in each barracks. They will be used for cigarette butts only. They will each have a minimum of 1" of water at all times. They will be cleaned daily.
7. Before departure of a unit, mattress covers will be removed and turned into Section Supply. Mattresses will be rolled up.
8. No liquor or alcoholic beverages will be introduced into or used in this camp.
9. Fire extinguishers, sand boxes and cans containing sand will not be removed from their present places on the wall or floor except in emergency.
10. The large red barrels containing water are for fire only.
11. Fire ladders will not be removed from hooks on the sides of the buildings except in case of emergencies.
12. All lights except fire lights outside of buildings and lights in latrines will be extinguished by 2200. During the day no unnecessary lights will be used. Nothing will be suspended from wiring in any building.
13. Windows will be kept closed during the day time in cold weather. Heating units will not be tampered with. Report to Company Commander any unit out of order.

14. Plumbing and electrical fixtures out of order will be reported to the Company Commander immediately. Troops will not try to repair same.

15. Immediately prior to the departure of troops all barracks and areas will be thoroughly cleaned and policed. Inspection will be made by Inspection Officer and CO of quartered troops.

16. The above regulations will be read to the troops at the earliest opportunity after their arrival and will be posted in all barracks.

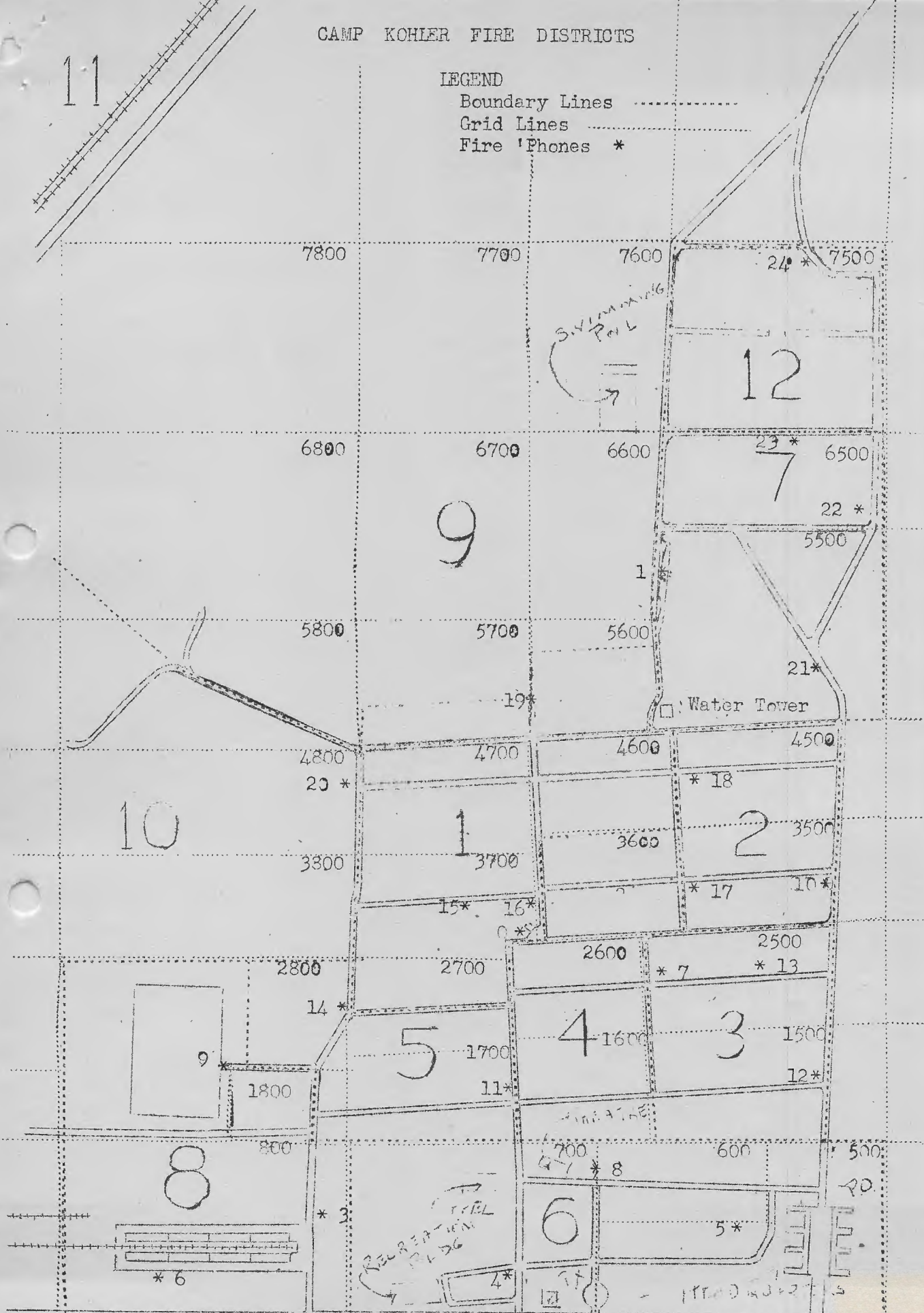

FIRE REGULATIONS

SECTION I: ALARMS: In case of Fire:

1. Warn occupants of building.
2. Sound the alarm by calling the operator from the nearest telephone (in hospital use the fire alarm box).
 - a. Give following information:

"I am reporting a fire". State location, Fire alarm Box Number and building number, contents of building if known. Remain at phone or fire alarm box until Fire Department arrives.
 - b. Operator will notify:
 - (1) Fire Marshal
 - (2) Adjutant or Officer of the Day
 - (3) Hospital
 - (4) Security and Intelligence Officer.
3. IN ALL CASES OF FIRE the Fire Department will be immediately notified. Delayed Fire Alarms will not be tolerated.
4. After Fire Department has arrived, the Fire Chief (or Assistant if Chief is not present) has full and sole responsibility and authority in all fire operations subject only to Fire Marshal and Commanding Officer. Every person, regardless of rank, shall accordingly obey and assist the Fire Chief in orders related to fire operations.

SECTION II: GENERAL FIRE PREVENTION:

1. All personnel on duty or employed at Camp Kohler will be charged with correcting conditions that may cause fires and for the detecting and extinguishing of fires at their inception.
2. Inflammable rubbish will not be allowed to accumulate in or near buildings, but will be deposited in metal containers and disposed of daily. Containers will be placed at a minimum of ten(10) feet from any building.
3. No burning in any area will be permitted, except by written permission of the Post Fire Marshal or Fire Chief.

4. Weeds and brush will be cleared from underneath all buildings and for a space not less than two feet around all buildings.

5. Roads and areas providing access and entrances to the warehouses and buildings will be kept free from obstruction to permit ready access of fire and emergency vehicles.

6. Smoking is prohibited in the following areas and buildings:

(a) Those parts of buildings containing inflammable storage and material. Signs reading "No Smoking" will be posted in these buildings.

(b) In open storage areas.

(c) In any area covered by dry grass or weeds.

(d) While lying in bunks.

7. Extreme caution will be observed that matches and cigarettes are completely extinguished before discarding.

8. Under no circumstances will the storage of gasoline, oils, kerosene, paints, varnishes and other combustible and volatile liquids be permitted in buildings other than those inspected by and under permit issued by the Fire Chief.

9. Removal of any fire fighting equipment from its normal place is only permitted for use against fire or for instruction and inspection purposes. All fire extinguishers are numbered and lettered to correspond with the building to which they are assigned and their proper location within that building. Changing location of, or obstructing access to fire extinguishers is positively prohibited.

10. Storage must be placed a minimum of four (4) feet from space heaters.

11. All fires will be reported to the Fire Department irrespective of their size or consequence in order that complete extinguishment may be ascertained by the Fire Department.

12. Prior to arrival of Fire Department, Troops delegated will attempt to extinguish fire. Upon arrival of Fire Department, all Troops will vacate the premises and remove to minimum of two hundred (200) feet from building.

13. Fire fighting personnel is not to be interfered with in any manner. Others, unless assigned to fire protection by the Post Commander will remain away from the zone of action until extinguishment has been completed.

14. Parking of cars within twenty (20) feet of any fire hydrant is prohibited, due to needs of fire pumping operations.

15. Parking of cars within ten (10) feet of any building, intersection of roads, or any fire road is prohibited.

16. Officers in charge of buildings will be directly responsible for the enforcement of all fire prevention regulations and for all persons under their jurisdiction being familiar with said Regulations.

17. Entry into or use of vacant or unoccupied buildings by unauthorized person or persons is absolutely prohibited. All buildings, either vacant or temporarily unoccupied, will be kept securely locked and barred by the Officer currently charged with the same.

18. No change, alteration, addition, or movement of any building, part of building, or any built-in equipment shall be made without previous permission in writing from the Post Fire Marshal.

19. Fire ladders will be kept in place on the sides of buildings.

20. All buildings will have a sufficient number of butt cans to be used as receptacles for cigarettes. These butt cans will have one to two inches of water in them at all times. Butt cans will not be used as receptacles for trash and paper.

SECTION III: PLACES OF ASSEMBLY:

1. Following are minimum safeguards considered necessary for protection of persons in places of public assembly including theatres:

(a) DECORATIONS:

(1) All combustible decorative material, including curtains, acoustical materials, streamers, cloth, cotton batting, straw, vines, trees, leaves and moss will be rendered flameproof and approved as such by Fire Chief, prior to use. Contact Fire Chief for further information.

(b) FIRE EXIT:

(1) Exits will be indicated with signs reading "FIRE EXIT". Signs will be placed directly over each exit and below the electric fixture if one has been provided.

(2) Required exits for the building or rooms will be plainly marked and sufficiently illuminated by red lights to be readily distinguished and kept burning while building is in use.

(3) During period of occupancy, fastenings on required exit doors will be such that the doors may be readily opened from the inside without the use of keys.

(4) Fire doors exits opening into the projection booth or adjoining rooms will be closed at all times during the showing of a film. Operations in room will conform to best current practice and be approved by Fire Chief.

(5) Exits will be at no time be obstructed or obscured in any manner. Ushers in theatres or places of assembly will ascertain prior to the beginning of an entertainment that all exits function properly and are free of any obstruction.

(6) All fire doors leading into and contained within hospital walkways will be kept closed.

(c). OVERCROWDING:

(1) During such entertainment functions, particular care will be exercised to prevent overcrowding. The number of persons at any gathering will not exceed the number which can be cared for by existing exits. Occupancy will not exceed the seating capacity in theatres or assembly halls and no standing will be permitted during entertainments, in the aisles or foyers leading to required exits.

(d) SMOKING:

(1) Smoking will not be permitted back stage, in the seating assembly or projection rooms of a theatre at any time. Smoking may be allowed in the foyer part of the theatre at the discretion of the Theatre Manager.

(e) FIRST AID FIRE APPLIANCES:

(1) An adequate number of first aid fire extinguishers are conveniently located in all places of assembly. Building attendants are directed to know their locations, condition, and how to operate them in the event of emergency.

(f) HOUSEKEEPING:

(1) All sections of the building will be kept free from accumulations of combustible rubbish.

(2) Storage of flammable liquid or chemicals will be prohibited in all buildings where assemblies, entertainment, or recreation facilities are provided.

(3) Film will be stored in a metal vault or tray. Clippings from film repair will be disposed of in a metal container.

(4) It is positively forbidden to allow film to remain in an open or exposed condition unless under actual repair. This particularly applies to NITROCELLULOSE film.

(g). AISLES:

(1) For each room or space where movable chairs or tables are to be used, arrangements will be made to provide ready access to aisles or exit doorways.

(2) Aisles in theatres will be free from obstructions at all times. Placing of chairs or other forms of seats in the aisles is strictly prohibited.

(h) These regulations will be posted permanently in a conspicuous place in all buildings of public assembly.

SECTION IV: FIRE REGULATIONS (WAREHOUSE AND STOREROOMS):

1. All storage will be placed three (3) feet from any outside walls or inside partitions in warehouses. Height of storage in warehouses will not exceed four (4) feet from under side of roof beams. Height of storage in storerooms will not be above the eaves of the building.

2. Different types of storage will be separated by three (3) feet passages and will not be stored in piles more than fourteen (14) feet in length, depth to be in accordance with construction allowance, (floor loading).

3. Corners of storage will be overlapped or secured in a manner to prevent tilting or falling. Props fastened to the sides of the building for supporting stacked storage are prohibited.

4. Skids will be placed under all storage to prevent excess water damage in case of fire.

NOTE: Provisions of paragraphs 1 to 4 inclusive, above, are applicable to all Hospital storage space, but are not applicable to Organizational Supply Rooms having less than 2,000 square feet of floor space.

5. Organization Fire Extinguisher Inspectors will conform to instructions as set forth in Section V, paragraph 3.

6. Smoking is prohibited in all parts of warehouses, storerooms or storehouses containing any type storage except that part partitioned and used exclusively for office work.

7. Accumulation of inflammable rubbish, paper, etc., is absolutely prohibited. (Refer to Section II, paragraph 2).

8. All warehouse men will acquaint themselves with the location of the nearest FIRE TELEPHONE and methods of transmitting fire alarms. Tampering with or damaging the automatic fire alarm system is prohibited. At the sounding of a fire alarm bell, warehouse men will immediately inspect the Building for fire, evacuate the building of all personnel, close all doors and report the location of the fire to the Fire Department when it arrives.

9. For storage of paints, oils, gasoline and other explosive liquids in warehouses, refer to Section II, paragraph 8.

10. Officers in charge of warehouses, storerooms, or storehouses will be directly responsible for the enforcement of all Fire Regulations and for all persons under their jurisdiction being familiar with said regulations.

SECTION V: FIRE EXTINGUISHER INSPECTION:

1. Responsible Officers or others using services charged with buildings will inspect and keep filled with water all pump tank type extinguishers, and will submit two copies of such inspection by the 5th and 20th of each month to the Post Fire Marshal (Post Engineer) noting needed repairs if such are required.

2. Special type fire extinguishers such as carbon-tetrachloride, carbon-dioxide, foam and soda-acid will be inspected and maintained exclusively by the Fire Department ONLY.

3. Inspection Procedure of Pump Tanks:

(a) Pump Tanks: Remove from wall bracket, insert hose nozzle into tank through lid opening at top and operate pump until water comes out of nozzle.

(b) Each pump tank has a small vent in the pump chamber inside the tank which expels fluid when the pump is operated. This action is not to be construed as indicating a broken or faulty pump.

(c) Proper level of fluid in tank is at the second line or indentation in the metal from the top of extinguisher.

(d) All pump tank extinguishers are to be kept in a clean serviceable condition and properly filled with water by the Officer charged with the building.

(e) The inspector detailed by the officer charged with the building will initial and date tag attached to each pump tank extinguisher. Additional tags can be obtained from the Fire Chief.

4. Barrels will be kept filled at all times. Fire buckets will be used for fire fighting only.

5. Each barracks or similar building will maintain a sand box and #10 can in the box to dip out the sand for oil fires. Sand is for smothering oil or grease fires. It should not be put inside any stove or heater.

SECTION VII: WIRE HAZARDS - ELECTRIC APPLIANCES:

1. To avoid danger of fire from electrical causes, the following abuses of electric installations are prohibited:

- (a) Using a total electric load exceeding 1200 Watts per barracks building. (Consult Post Electrician for other type construction).
- (b) Overloading individual lamp holders - maximum 200 Watts.
- (c) Radios, electric irons and other appliances are to be plugged into electric wall outlets provided in buildings. Connecting wires to feeder line, or using other improvisations is strictly prohibited.
- (d) The use of drop or extension cords fastened to or by any vicinity of gasoline or other like volatiles.
- (f) The use of frayed or worn out extension cords.
- (g) Changing or adding to any electrical circuit on the Post except by authority of the Post Engineer.
- (h) Allowing water during policing of building to enter outlets and/or switches.
- (i) TAMPERING WITH FUSES: (When a fuse is blown out call Post Utilities, Extension 180.

2. It will be the responsibility of the organization commander to inspect or have inspected frequently all buildings for observance and enforcement of the above safety requirements.

SECTION VIII: EVACUATION FIRE DRILL - OUTLINE:

1. The attached FIRE EVACUATION DRILL OUTLINE is a method of instruction to be followed by all officers, organizations and departments responsible for the welfare of personnel under their command. This outline with minimum modifications will be used in all buildings on the Post. Responsible officers will initiate the effect at once fire drills to assure proficiency of personnel. Fire drills will be held once each month thereafter. Report of such drills to be forwarded to the Post Fire Marshal.

(a). Fire drill instruction will at all times include the following outline procedure:

- (1) Notify the Fire Department the location of the Fire by building number.
- (2) Evacuate the building of personnel; keep personnel off fire roads and at least 200 feet from the building.
- (3) Attempt to extinguish the fire if possible; use the ladders if needed.

SECTION IX: FIRE DISTRICT MAP herewith indicates division of the Post into twelve (12) fire Districts for fire operations.

1. The California High School Cadet Regiment will be formed in column with the head of the First Battalion, followed by the 2nd and 3rd Battalions, facing north at the intersection of Barker and May Streets, Friday, 29 March 1945, at 1530 hrs. The band and Adjutant will take position on field indicated by markers.

2. Adjutant's call will be sounded at 1600 hrs.; followed by the following sequence of movements:

Companies will mass 20 paces right to left.

Company guides will form on the battalion line indicated by markers and properly dressed. The Regimental commander will take his post and the troops stand at ease after being properly formed while awaiting arrival of the Governor and other members of the Review Party.

When the Reviewing party is in position, the Adjutant will direct the band to SOUND OFF.

Upon completing the SOUND OFF, the band will troop up between the Regimental Adjutant and Battalion Commanders.

When the band has returned to position and halted it will sound RETREAT.

Upon completion of RETREAT the battalions will be brought to PRESENT ARMS. The band will play the NATIONAL ANTHEM WITHOUT command.

The annual encampment of the California High School Cadets at Camp Kohler, Sacramento, was climaxed this morning with the presentation of individual awards to cadets, selected for their proficiency during the 6-day camp period. (LIST ATTACHED).

The colorful ceremony took place before the entire regiment of the 633 cadets from 101 high schools throughout California. Lt. Colonel William Rutherford of the Adjutant General's Department, Administrative Officer of the Corps, made the presentations. Army officers and attending commandants from represented high schools were reviewing officers for the review that followed.

The cadets immediately broke camp to depart for their homes, transported in army trucks by California State Guard detachments, activated for this purpose as a tactical maneuver.

"The spirit and performance of these cadets have been outstanding," stated Rutherford. "Visiting Army officers throughout the encampment were strongly impressed with the excellent deportment and general conduct of the entire regiment. I am very proud of the accomplishments and progress of the cadet program throughout California this year, made possible through the support and cooperation of the participating schools and the fine work of the school commandants."

A formal regimental review marked the close of yesterday. Brigadier General Victor R. Hansen, the Adjutant General, was the reviewing officer and his guests included Lieutenant Governor Houser, members of the State Legislature, and American Legion representatives. The military reviewing party included: Colonel William Patient, McClellan Field; Lt. Colonel Thomas Cunningham, Director of Schools, Ninth Service Command, Fort Douglas; Lt. Colonel William R. Wilson, PMS & T, Ninth Service Command; Major Gilson McNeill, Commanding Officer of Camp Kohler, and staff officers.

Major George E. Calloway, Special Services Section, McClellan Field,

arranged a variety show in the evening for the cadets, staged by Air Force personnel and special guests.

Camp Kohler was made available for the encampment by General H. H. Arnold, Commanding General of the Army Air Forces.

Lt. Colonel W. R. Wilson of Oakland, Professor of Military Science and Tactics, briefed cadets on the Army Specialized Training Program for 17 year olds. Applicants for this training must achieve a satisfactory score on an ASTRP Qualifying Test which will be administered in the high schools of the county on 12 April 1945. In addition to passing the ASTRP Qualifying Test, an applicant must meet certain requirements of age, citizenship, high school graduation, and must enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps.
